



THE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE, FOOD AND WINE HONOURS SCHOLARSHIPS Rules

BACKGROUND

The School of Agriculture, Food and Wine at the University of Adelaide has established Honours Scholarships to assist students undertaking an Honours program of study. All students who are accepted for honours in the School and who are not recipients of another Scholarship are considered for this Scholarship.

The following rules are hereby made:-

RULES OF THE SCHOLARSHIP

1. The Scholarship shall be known as the "School of Agriculture, Food and Wine Honours Scholarship".
2. The number of Scholarships offered each year shall be determined by the Head of School on an annual basis.
3. The value of each Scholarship shall be up to \$3,000.00, payable in two equal instalments direct to the student following confirmation of enrolment and satisfactory academic progress after each of the census dates (March and August).
4. The Scholarship will provide assistance with education and living expenses for the Honours program.

Eligibility

5. To be considered for the Scholarship, students must be commencing an Honours degree in the School of Agriculture, Food and Wine.
6. Students in receipt of other University of Adelaide Scholarships of equal or greater value are not eligible to receive this Scholarship.
7. If a student is in receipt of another University of Adelaide Scholarship of lesser value, this Scholarship will provide a top-up to the value of \$3,000.

Selection of Candidate

8. The Scholarship recipients will be selected by the Head of School (or nominee) taking into consideration academic merit.

Administration

9. The Scholarships shall be administered by the School of Agriculture, Food and Wine.

10. The Scholarship must be taken up in the year in which it is offered; acceptance of the scholarship offer cannot be deferred. If a student declines the scholarship offer, the scholarship will be offered to the next eligible student.
11. The Scholarship will be terminated where:
 - a student ceases to be enrolled in the approved program of study at the University;
 - a student has provided false or misleading information with regard to their personal details;
 - a student has failed to maintain satisfactory academic progress for two consecutive semesters;
 - a student is guilty of serious misconduct in terms of the University Policy Rules for Student Conduct in the University.
12. The University may vary the rules from time to time in a manner consistent with the University's legal obligations and policies.
